

The Key to Clean Water

Collaborating to Conserve Open Spaces and Water Quality

The Newfound Watershed is defined in part by its open spaces and unfragmented forests: the summit of Mount Cardigan and the forests that surround it; the open flats in Alexandria; the hills of Bridgewater; the dense forests in the upper reaches of the Cockermouth River in Groton. These open spaces provide us with endless recreation opportunities, firewood and other forest products, maple syrup, and, of course, the peace and solace of the natural world. Linked together these open space areas allow for safe wildlife passage through different habitat types. Healthy, mature forests store greenhouse gasses such as carbon and filter stormwater to ensure our rivers, streams, and Newfound Lake are clean.

One of the best ways to preserve the quality of the water in Newfound Lake is to protect the lands surrounding it. Town forests, land owned by conservation groups, state land, and conservation easements all ensure this valuable open space will be protected in perpetuity. There are economic benefits too. A study from the Trust for Public Land found that every \$1 invested in land conservation returned \$11 in natural goods and services to the New

Fifty years ago when the NLRA got started, I can remember seeing lake lovers like Peter Brown, John Gemmill, Mason Westfall, Louise Devost, Dick Beyer, and so many others working on water monitoring, trying to control runoff, and taking steps to raise awareness about protecting the lake. Inspired by their work, I came to understand we had a precious resource in Newfound's clear water, the wildlife in and around the lake, the hills and forests. How a storm can come out of nowhere and change everything fast still amazes me.

I took up sailing a Sunfish that I could rent for \$5 at Peter Brown's Boat Shop because I couldn't get enough of the lake. Sailing on that Sunfish is where I learned my love of sailing and felt one with the lake, and Pasquaney Bay became my happy place, swimming, fishing, canoeing, and regularly watching the breathtaking sunsets over Crosby and Tenney Mountains with my family.

Fifty years later, my childhood memories of Newfound and those pioneers

Climate change, and the host of issues it brings with it, harmful algal blooms, and development pressure all pose a threat to Newfound Lake and its surrounding watershed. To guide us in addressing these challenges, we are developing a strategic plan for NLRA, creating a vision for the future of NLRA through the next five, ten, and even 50 years.

I've enjoyed the strategic planning process. Through our engagement sessions we've discussed NLRA's important work in environmental health and education

Watershed Planning – Linking Land Use to Water Quality

A watershed plan is a key tool to maintaining and even improving water quality in Newfound Lake. It outlines the goals for the watershed and the initiatives needed to reach those goals. Made possible with federal funding from the Clean Water Act and administered through the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, the NLRA has operated with a watershed plan since 2009, and in early 2021 received our fifth watershed plan grant. This funding over the past nearly fifteen years has had enormous and lasting positive impact on the Newfound Watershed.

The primary focus and outcome for all watershed plan implementation projects is to reach water quality goals. The greatest threat to water quality in Newfound is stormwater, and to that end we have implemented stormwater management projects — both large-scale projects with town and NHDOT partners such as road paving and culvert replacement, and small-scale projects with homeowners to reduce

stormwater runoff on private property. To date, this work has prevented an estimated 566,483 pounds of sediment and 278 pounds of phosphorus from entering the lake.

The watershed plans also benefits towns, with funds available to help each watershed town shape their land use regulations and master plans in ways that benefit water quality. Ordinances that regulate lot density and setbacks from surface water are two ways towns can protect their water.

By far the best way to protect water quality is to maintain healthy forests. Identifying land conservation priorities in the Newfound watershed was made possible by watershed plan implementation, helping the Newfound Land Conservation Partnership to increase the amount of land conserved in the watershed (now at nearly 25% of the watershed, over 14,000 acres!).

With watershed plan grant funding secured, watershed plan projects will begin this summer and continue through 2023.

- We will continue to work with watershed towns, assisting them with creating lake-friendly regulations and reducing stormwater on town roads and properties.
- We will invest in communicating our work and the watershed plan to the public, upgrading our website to be a user-friendly and up-to-date resource.
- Our Youth Conservation Corps crew will continue working with landowners and homeowner associations to implement small scale stormwater projects.
- Finally, we will tackle some of the biggest stormwater problems in the watershed, including a study to look at the massive stream blowout in the Cockermouth River subwatershed in Groton.

We are thrilled to continue our partnership with NH DES as we embark on this next round of watershed plan funding and will continue protecting the water quality of Newfound Lake through action. For more information on our latest projects, visit the NLRA website: newfoundlake.org.

Partnerships for a Bright, Green Future

Connecting youth to nature benefits us all. Not only does fostering a love for the natural world ensure the future of conservation, children show great gains from time spent in nature as well, from improved test scores to better physical and mental well-being.

NLRA partners with the Minot-Sleeper Library and the Slim Baker Foundation to collaborate on programs and opportunities that inspire local youth to explore and engage with our watershed. In 2020 we worked with these partners to create new programs, including Read Around Newfound, an initiative to host StoryWalks® through the watershed, a virtual Nature Storytime, and Newfound Nature Station, a free program with activities designed for kids of all ages.

Along with continuing these popular programs, there are exciting new opportunities in the works for the current year. On the first Friday of every month, June-October, at 11 am, the Minot-Sleeper Library, NLRA, and the Slim Baker Founda-

Invasive Species Protection

Invasive aquatic species disrupt the natural ecosystem and lower our water quality. Volunteers guard Newfound from aquatic invasive species by offering complimentary boat checks at Newfound's boat launches as a Lake Host, or paddle, motor, or snorkel the shores of Newfound to help us keep a watchful eye out for colonies of invasive plants as a Weed Watcher.

Education and Community Outreach

Water Quality Monitoring

Volunteers collect water quality samples from Newfound Lake or its tributaries, providing the data we need to monitor for pollution and other water quality concerns. Lake water quality monitors collect water samples from Newfound Lake, and tributary water quality monitors collect samples from tributaries throughout the watershed.



Water quality volunteers help provide an understanding of water quality in Newfound Lake and its tributaries. We use data to assess long-term trends and to help inform land use decisions and stormwater management projects.



AROUND THE LAKE

Lake Level Update

The level of Newfound Lake is managed and controlled by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services Dam Bureau. In 2018 and 2019 the Dam Bureau held several public hearings to address Newfound Lake level management. As a result the levels are currently being managed by an adjusted interim management plan to balance the needs of lake users and the natural environment.

Drought conditions in 2020 made lake level management difficult for the Dam Bureau. Without the inflow from tributaries, and the requirement to maintain flow downstream in the Newfound River, lake levels remained below management objectives. Looking forward to summer 2021, we are already experiencing dry conditions. The Dam Bureau is taking this into consider-



ation, aiming to err on the side of higher lake

Annual Message from the Treasurer

I'm pleased to report strong results for 2020 which leaves your organization in great financial shape. Despite the economic hardships caused by the pandemic, our supporters continued to recognize the important work NLRA does in protecting the Newfound Lake watershed. Total revenue of \$500,452 easily covered our expenses, reduced due to restricted operations, of \$382,393. This left us in a stronger cash position going into 2021 than normal, which makes us optimistic about expanding our work in the new year.

While operations contributed to our healthy financial condition, the market also had a net positive effect on our endowment. More important was the increase in the endowment's Program & Partnerships Fund made possible through the generous contributions of Steve and Cheryl Jonas, and many other supporters who contributed to help support NLRA's educational programing, while extending our partnerships with organizations that support our mission. Our total endowed funds climbed from \$550,755 at the beginning of the year to \$792,715 at year end.

This gives us a great foundation on which to build the future of NLRA. Thanks to all our supporters for making this happen.

Hampshire economy. And conserved land can lead to tax savings since open space requires less town infrastructure — schools, roads, and life-services — so they are less of a tax burden for taxpayers than residential development.

In 2007, a group of individuals concerned with the pace of development in the watershed met to determine how to balance new development with land conservation. From these efforts the Newfound Land Conservation Partnership (NLCP) was established in 2009 and has now driven land conservation in the Newfound Watershed for over a decade. This group, comprised of local watershed residents, the Newfound Lake Region Association, Lakes Region Conservation Trust, Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, The Nature Conservancy (new to the partnership in 2017), and representatives from NH

Audubon, has helped conserve 5,000 acres of land since its inception. Over 14,000 acres, or 24% of land in the Newfound watershed, is now protected.

The NLCP works with landowners to discuss their goals and the many options for permanent protection for their property, whether for wildlife improvement, to keep land in the family, or to continue farming and forestry. This can mean a number of things, including donating or selling a conservation easement for the property or an outright sale or donation of the property. In 2011, the John Gemmill Fund was established to assist landowners in covering transaction costs, such as surveys, appraisals, and stewardship funds for land conservation projects.

In 2016 NLRA worked with state mapping experts and watershed representatives to identify areas most important for conservation. Representatives rated the water-

shed's wetlands, streams, wildlife habitat, and steep slopes, from most important to least important, resulting in a series of maps that identify conservation priorities. NLCP uses these maps to identify land that is important to conserve.

Notable NLCP projects include the conservation of the Kimball Hill property in 2018, which protected a vast stretch of the Cockermouth River subwatershed. The partnership is currently working with landowners in all five watershed towns and looking to protect property around the Alexandria aquifer, which provides drinking water to the town of Bristol and supplies a significant amount of water to the lake through the Fowler River.

NLRA participates in the NLCP as the local watershed group. We also hold conservation easements and own conservation property!

Grey Rocks Conservation Area

In 2011, we were given Grey Rocks Conservation Area which is protected by a conservation easement. We work closely with the easement holder — the Lakes Region Conservation Trust — to make sure all of our management and restoration activities fit within the legal requirements of the conservation easement. NLRA is working to restore the ecological function of Grey Rocks, while allowing for access and enjoyment of this beautiful area along the Cockermouth River.





Goose Pond and Sugarloaf Conservation Area

We also hold the conservation easement for the Goose Pond and Sugarloaf Conservation Area in Alexandria. As easement holders, we work with the landowner — the Lakes Region Conservation Trust — to make sure that their land management activities are in accordance with the legal stipulations in the easement.
