NLRA adds expertise to invigorate programs and meet conservation needs

The Newfound Lake Region Association is growing. Record numbers of members are joining in support of watershed conservation, new volunteers are signing up for on-the-ground protection efforts, and projects with local partners — from land trusts to libraries — are seeing incredible successes.

This upward trajectory is fueled by

the knowledge that conservation of the Newfound Watershed is essential to protecting everything we cherish about it, and that the conservation needs of Newfound are growing.

To better serve the community and achieve our mission, the NLRA has brought on two new full-time staff members in 2022. These positions will bring

in the expertise we need to boost core objectives:

Increase Environmental Protection

Conserving Newfound and environmental protection is at the core of what we do at NLRA. Moving forward we will dig deeper into our extensive water quality data to understand and address watershed health concerns and broaden the scope of our environmental monitoring to include new and important threats to the watershed, all to ensure Newfound remains the treasured resource it has been for generations.

Grow Stewardship

Our community — residents and visitors of every age and background — is key to ensuring we can continue our work to protect Newfound. Inspiring our community to action takes engagement, interaction, and

Exploring the Watershed in Winter

Newfound Nature Station engages youth year-round

ewfound Nature Station is an NLRA program that gets youth and families closer to nature through hands-on, nature-themed activities. As the families that participated in December's Nature Station event can now attest, winter in the watershed offers unique opportunities for exploration.

With snowshoes courtesy of the Tapply-Thompson Community Center, kids tramped the trails of Grey Rocks on the hunt for "nature treasures" like pine cones, leaves, and feathers. They then gathered at the picnic area to identify their finds in guidebooks, inspect their finds under magnifying lenses, and warm their hands around cups of hot cocoa before using their treasures to create artful "magic wands" and walking sticks.

With crafts complete and many hot chocolate mustaches, the enthusiasm for the winter landscape remained. Snowmen popped up in twos and threes, and

more seasonal treasures were found in the forms of dried seed heads and fungi. A shrew appeared from a hole in the snow, leading to conversations about animal habitats and a lesson on the subnivean zone.

In spite of the cold weather, this was the most successful and engaging Nature Station to date. Kids left with meaningful memories, new knowledge, and a heightened appreciation for the outdoors, a proven precursor to strong conservation principles.




Expanding Land Conservation in the Newfound Watershed

New conserved properties and a fund for further protection

rotecting land — by conserving our healthy forests, fields, and other open spaces — remains the best way to protect the water quality of Newfound Lake and build resilience against climate change. Land conservation is an important aspect of the NLRA's mission to protect the lake and watershed, and all of our land conservation efforts take place through the Newfound Land Conservation Partnership. The NLCP is a unique collaboration pairing community volunteers with expertise from the NLRA, the Lakes Region Conservation Trust (LRCT), the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, and The Nature Conservancy.

Established in 2009, the Partnership is a resource for landowners and communities interested in land conservation. It promotes the benefits of land conservation to protect water quality and wildlife habitat, preserve family lands, and protect scenic landscapes and the quality of life in the Newfound Watershed. Since its inception, the NLCP has driven total land conserved in the watershed up to 25%, and are now working toward the goal of 30% land conserved by 2030. This new goal mirrors movements led by experts and organizations across the globe to address loss of nature and the effects of climate change. Learn more about the NLCP at NewfoundLake.org/NLCP.



Forever Newfound

A new fund to support land conservation in the Newfound Watershed

Martha Twombly and Mark Coulson are honoring the legacy of Phil and Betsy Twombly by establishing the Forever Newfound Land Conservation Fund. Phil and Betsy of Hebron were devoted to all things Newfound and supporters of the Newfound Lake Region Association since its beginning. The family has a nearly 100-year history on Newfound, with Betsy spending every summer of her life at the log cabin her father built in 1929, "Owlshead." The Fund will begin with \$100,000 to provide grants for the purchase costs of land or conservation easements within the Newfound Watershed by any qualified land trust.

The **Forever Newfound Fund** is a legacy fund that can expand into the future. It was inspired by, and complements, the **John Gemmill Newfound Fund**, which provides support to cover landowner transaction costs. Big Strides in Newfound Land Conservation

Land conservation happens from the ground up, with families, neighbors, and communities coming together to protect their fields and forests and realize their shared values of conservation. This was certainly true in 2021, where volunteers and engaged residents laid the groundwork for two new land conservation projects in the Newfound Watershed.

Bridgewater Hill


Chris Keppelman and Jim Mulroy are passionate about their Bridgewater land and Newfound Lake. They have wanted to conserve their property for many years, but they took a step further and reached out to their neighbors to invite them to consider this option. What began as a conversation among neighbors has led to the first Bridgewater land conservation project within the Newfound Watershed. Four neighbors are joining together to conserve their properties — approximately 170 acres all together. The land surrounds several year-round tributaries to Dick Brown Brook, water that then flows into Newfound Lake. The permanent protection of land in this upland neighborhood ensures that it will continue to play a vital role in preserving water quality, habitat, and scenic beauty, maintaining the special character and remarkable natural qualities of Bridgewater Hill. Chris and Jim are the first to conserve their land, generously donating a 105-acre conservation easement on their property, which will be held by LRCT. Neighbors Richard and Carolyn Lobban and Frank and Phoebe Griswold are donating conservation easements on their own property, and Fred and Cathy Short are donating their land to LRCT, with completion expected in 2022.


Landowner Options for Conservation

What do you envision for the future of your land? Through land conservation, property owners can meet a variety of goals.

Land Donation transfers title and ownership to a land trust. Land donors may realize significant tax advantages in return for their generosity.

Conservation Easement Donation transfers some or all development rights to a land trust. This is a flexible option that can be crafted to





Bargain Sale of Land or Conservation Easement pairs the income-producing benefit of sale with potential tax advantages.

Sale of Land or Conservation Easement protects properties of very significant conservation value when a family is not able to donate part or all of the value of their land.

NLCP evaluates lands for high quality conservation values and works with landowners to honor their wishes and priorities in preserving their land. For more information visit: NewfoundLake.org/NLCP.

Hebron

An 80-acre property on the northwest shoulder of Bear Mountain in Hebron has also been conserved by the NLCP. Clearly visible from the Lake and properties along its eastern shore, the land features important wildlife habitat on the ridge and recreation opportunities including walking and snow-shoeing, as well as an established snowmobile trail. The Lakes Region Conservation Trust now owns and protects the land. The

LRCT will maintain the snowmobile trail as an important link in the snowmobile trail network around Newfound Lake and open the property to the public for hiking in the future. The purchase of this property was funded by the grassroots efforts of NLCP volunteers, who connected with generous residents who value the protection of high ridge landscapes around the lake.

A Place for Protection and Connection

Serving the watershed and the community with a building at Grey Rocks

We envision Grey Rocks Conservation Area to be the heart of local watershed conservation: a place that inspires our neighbors and visitors to protect Newfound, a center for engaging community programs, for community members to make connections with each other and the watershed, and a place of scientific study. In November 2021, the NLRA board of trustees made an important decision to bring this vision to fruition by authorizing the planning of a multi-functional building at Grey Rocks.

We are now working with an architect to design a space that will give us the capacity to best protect Newfound Lake and serve the Newfound community.

A building at Grey Rocks has been seen as a key development since the property was first given to NLRA a decade ago. We are now working with an architect to design a space that will give us the capacity to best protect Newfound Lake and serve the

Newfound community. Under the direction of our 2021 strategic plan, the leadership of an experienced steering committee, and the guidance of our broader community, a building at Grey Rocks will provide a community space for education, events, and exhibits and serve as the NLRA headquarters for conservation, with space for staff and a water quality lab, all while modeling re-

sponsible shorefront development.

We are still in the early stages of building design and making plans for fundraising. Fully Funded!

Rob Moore Fund for Clean Water and Community Awareness

At the 2021 NLRA Annual Meeting in August, Kelly Dunn and the Dunn Family Foundation, along with an anonymous donor, generously offered \$200,000 for a new endowment fund in honor of longtime NLRA president Rob Moore, if we could raise an additional \$100,000. Thanks to the overwhelming response from the Newfound community, we were able to meet this challenge in just four months. The Rob Moore Fund for Clean Water and Community Awareness is fully funded at \$300,000 and managed by the NLRA Investment Committee with the NLRA endowment funds. These funds will be put to work to expand programmatic offerings, increase environmental monitoring, and protect against emerging threats to Newfound.

The state of your Association is as strong as ever. Our latest fiscal year end of 9/30/2021 showed net positive results from operations of \$93,128. This is a testament not only to strong ongoing support from our members but also careful attention to how we use your contributions.

Separate from our annual operating revenue and expenses is the Association's endowment, something started more than 15 years ago and carefully nurtured ever since. With significant support from many of you and a friendly market, the endowment has grown to \$1,322,417 as of 12/31/2021. This is an important safety valve against short-term funding disruptions which will

allow us to continue meeting our mission requirements of protecting the Newfound Lake watershed. It is also an increasingly important source of annual support as we use its earnings in conformance with our donor's expectations.

Now in 2022 NLRA is exceptionally positioned for the future. With no liabilities, a strong operating cash position, a fully staffed team, and a new strategic plan, there are many great things you'll see over the next three years. Clear Water Society Portrait: Val Scarborough

Clear Water Society Members come from varied backgrounds, but they all share a love of Newfound Lake and a desire to see its rich resources protected. Here, new Clear Water Society member Val Scarborough shares her story:

What is your connection to Newfound Lake?

My parents and brothers started vacationing at Newfound Lake before I was born, so I've had a connection to the lake my entire life. My parents purchased our family property in Hebron in 1958, and I spent every summer of my childhood there. I now live close by in Plymouth, just minutes from our place on the lake, and have had the privilege of serving on the NLRA's Board of

Trustees since 2017. My Newfound family now includes spouses, children, and grandchildren, as well as neighbors who are lifelong friends. It's such a joy to spend time together at this magical place!

What was your motivation for making a planned gift?

My mother always extolled the astonishing clarity of Newfound's water and was one of the earliest members of the NLRA. I have been an NLRA member for many years and have a deep appreciation of the Association's role in protecting our Lake and its watershed. When I revised my estate plan last year, including a planned gift to the NLRA was the natural next step for me to take in supporting their critical work.

What do you want your legacy to be?

If I can contribute toward future generations' experience of the natural world by helping to preserve Newfound Lake and its watershed, that will be a meaningful legacy.

What is your vision for Newfound's future?

We have all seen the negative effects of stormwater pollution and development on Newfound's water quality and have watched with trepidation as invasive species have taken hold in neighboring lakes. I think the NLRA has done a remarkable job of holding these threats at bay, and I believe the Association is poised to offer even more effective education and programs, in collaboration with other organizations and property owners, that will go further to protecting our Lake. I hope for improved water quality, controlled development, and more land conservation.

2021 Volunteer Highlights

- Volunteers dedicated 100+ hours to monitoring water quality at 43 sampling sites across the watershed, adding to decades of data that alert us to environmental issues and inform conservation decisions.
- Weed Watchers monitored 3+ miles of sensitive shoreline for invasive aquatic species that could damage water quality and recreation.
- Education volunteers led over 140 kids of all ages through hands-on programs, connecting them to local ecology and cultivating a love of Newfound Lake.
- Guiding and governing NLRA, trustees are some of our hardest working volunteers, shaping the vision for Newfound's future with a new strategic plan in 2021.
- From spreadsheet specialists to envelope-stuffing superheroes, administrative volunteers provide behind-the-scenes support to conservation. In 2021 they stuffed over 2,000 envelopes with news about NLRA's efforts, keeping Newfounders up-to-date on conservation work.
